Grand opening of the Maugean Skate Art Exhibition (SKATEx)

The inaugural SKATEx Maugean Skate Art Exhibition is being officially opened at 2pm Saturday 14 January at Strahan Primary School.

Artists from across Tasmania were invited to create their own skate-inspired art to help raise the profile of the endangered Maugean Skate and the challenges it faces. This event is being run by Cradle Coast NRM as part of the Maugean Skate Awareness Project, supported through funding from the Australian Government.

Cradle Coast NRM have received 74 entries for SKATEx across a huge diversity of art mediums including paintings on canvas, pastel and pencil drawings, sculptured skates from native timber and recycled steel, skates crafted from felt and vintage woollen blankets as well as skates made from materials found along the coastline such as driftwood, glass and pieces of marine debris. The exhibition also includes delicate jewellery pieces made from silver and polymer clay, and entries from Strahan Primary School students.

An expert panel of art-savvy volunteer judges met today to cast their eyes over the collection and provide their commendations and comments on the diverse artworks.

Prizes will be awarded for the exceptional entries followed by an afternoon tea.

Maugean Skates are Tasmania's largest endemic fish and also one of the state's most endangered marine species. These ancient Gondwanan relicts live only in the tannin-stained waters of Macquarie Harbour on the West Coast of Tasmania where they have resided for countless generations.
